In the presence of a minyan, mourners say:

Magnified and sanctified may His great name be, in the world He created by His will. May He establish His kingdom in your lifetime and in your days, and in the lifetime of all the House of Israel, swiftly and soon – and say: Amen.

Mourner:

Bow, take three steps back, then bow, first left, then right, then centre, while saying:

May He who makes peace in His high places, make peace for us and all Israel – and say: Amen.

Wait a few moments and then take three steps forward.

When Minchah is said on its own, many have the practice to recite a Psalm (either Psalm 49 or Psalm 16 depending on the dates).

Laws of Kaddish

- The Kaddish requires the presence of a minyan, that is, ten adult males.
- It is our custom to say Kaddish standing.
- It is also our custom that all mourners recite Kaddish in unison.
- The Sages attached particular significance to the response, "May His great name be blessed for ever and all time." This should be said with full concentration by all present.

Note: 'ch' is pronouced as in the Scottish 'loch'

In the presence of a minvan, mourners say:

Yitgadal v'yitkadash sh'meh rabba. B'al'ma dee v'ra chiruteh, v'yamleech malchuteh, b'chayeychon, uv-yomeychon, uv-chayey dee chol beyt Yisra-el, ba-aqala uvizman kareev, v'imru Amen.

Y'heh sh'meh rabba mevarach l'alam ulal'mei al'ma-ya.

Mourner:

Yitbarach v'yishtabach v'yitpa-ar v'yitromam v'yitnaseh v'yithadar v'yitaleh v'yit-hallal sh'meh dee kud'sha, b'reech hu. L'ela*

(*Between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur say: L'ela, L'ela)

min kol birchata v'sheerata tushb'chata v'nechemata, dee amiran b'al'ma, v'imru, Amen.

Y'heh sh'lama rabba min sh'maya v'chayim aleynu v'al kol Yisra-el v'imru Amen.

Bow, take three steps back, then bow, first left, then right, then centre, while saying:

Oseh shalom bimromav, hu ya'aseh shalom aleynu, v'al kol Yisra-el, v'imru Amen.

Wait a few moments and then take three steps forward.
